Command Spanish® Program Data Sheet for Spanish for First Responders

Materials Description and Content: Spanish for First Responders (SFR) is published by Command Spanish®, Inc. and consists of a 66-page manual bound in a 3-ring binder with 2 accompanying CDs. It was developed in consultation with paramedics, EMTs, police officers and firefighters. In addition to a special section devoted to pronunciation, SFR contains the following work-specific language sections: Initial Arrival on the Scene; Initial Assessment; Quick Commands; Chief Complaint: Injury; Chief Complaint: Illness; Assessment and Medical History; Initial Treatment; Body Commands for Triage and Treatment; Accident Scene; Trauma, Bleeding and Shock; Musculoskeletal Injuries; Injuries to the Head and Spine; Chest Pain and Cardiac Arrest; Unconscious Patient; Diabetic Emergencies; Seizures; Allergies, Bites and Stings; Poison Emergencies; Hypothermia & Hyperthermia; Behavioral Emergency; Child Birth; Child Involved in Accident; and Transport and Paperwork. SFR also contains the following appendices: Parts of the Body; Medical Glossary; Allergens Glossary, Universal Patient Information Forms; and Numeric Pain Scale.

Program Description: This program is designed to teach non-Spanish-speaking First Responders to use Spanish language commands and phrases that will enable them to assist Spanish-speaking persons in emergencies. Emphasis is placed on concise Spanish to assess the nature of the emergency, determine the patient's chief complaint, nature of injury or illness, aid in movement or extraction of the involved person, as well as explain basic procedures and treatment. **No prior knowledge of Spanish is necessary.**

Goal: To teach non-Spanish-speaking First Responders the Spanish commands, questions, and phrases that are necessary to manage emergency situations involving one or more Spanish-speaking persons.

Objectives: Upon completion, participants will be able to use Spanish to do some or all of the following: render immediate emergency aid; engage in triage protocol; make initial physical assessment of patient; issue phrases and commands for controlling scene; obtain pertinent information; calm victims and their families; explain treatment performed by EMT; determine patient's chief complaint; facilitate transport of injured person; pronounce key Spanish phrases clearly and correctly.

Methods of Instruction: Modeling, intensive drill, choral response, alpha-beta line, learning pairs and triads, Total Physical Response, role-playing, simulations, and situation cards.

Cross-Cultural Component: None.

Intended Audience: This program is intended for First Responders, paramedics, EMTs, uniformed patrol officers, rescue squads, firefighters, air medical pilots, and nurses. It conforms to the requirements of the First Responder: National Standard Curriculum.

Length of Instruction: 12 to 24 hours, depending on client's needs and interests.

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
